Instructions for Your Campaign:

Search the web for an online letter writing or petition campaign that matches your vision.

Instructions for Your Campaign:

Education and Outreach

To create real political change you need to create a movement of people who can express their voice together on an issue. Without education and outreach, issues can not garner the support they need to sway Congress. Plus, come election time you can make sure people know who the best candidates are and sway them at the ballot box.

Instructions for Your Campaign:

Create a flyer to send home with your fellow students, urging your parents to "Take Action" personally and politically on climate change.

Your flyer could focus on issues such as: An overview of the issue or campaign. What they can to reduce their footprint How your elected officials or candidates for office feel on this issue Resources to join the campaign.

Please create the flyer on behalf of the entire class, making sure to explain why this is an important Jewish issue.

Your teacher will photocopy it, so you can distribute it to everyone in your class (and more if you'd like).

Protest

Public protest has long been an important technique in raising awareness about an issue and showing the politicians how the public feels. By bring the issue to a public place, you stir discussion and debate and hopefully raise the profile of an issue.

Instructions for Your Campaign:

Help promote your cause using your own knowledge and creativity, in a large public way. Create a protest that your class can hold as your parents arrive to support solutions to climate change.

Your protest should include:

A positive message (a pro protest)

A simple message and how people can get involved

A simple chant that the entire class can sing.

Posters and signs, with slogans and information

Use the arts and crafts materials to make signs and posters. When possible please use re-used Cardboard and other paper products, to save on the climate effects of paper production.

Be ready to teach your chant to the other students and lead them in a protest.

Lobbying

Lobbying people in positions of power has long been the fastest technique to get something done. If you have the ear of the politicians you have a real chance to change their minds. Whether it's because you are right, or because the politician need your support, either way lobbying gets the job done.

Instructions for Your Campaign:

Lobbying objective: To convince your synagogue to officially support climate action.

Sample Letters to Government

On reducing greenhouse emissions Date: Dear Representative

Global warming and climate change pose an imminent threat to the stability of the planet, our natural ecosystems and millions of humans worldwide. As a concerned citizen of the United States and as Jew, I believe we have a responsibility to care for our planet, protecting the health of people and all Creation.

I therefore strongly urge you to sponsor the Safe Climate Act (H.R. 1590). This bill is a science-based long-term solution to global warming that will help protect future generations from the worst effects of global warming. America is already suffering from the impacts of global warming, including increased droughts and heat waves, sea levels rise, and stronger more devastating hurricanes.

The Safe Climate Act reduces U.S. emissions of global warming pollution to 1990 levels by 2020 and to 80% below 1990 levels by 2050. Scientists agree these are the reductions needed to curb the most damaging impacts. This is achieved though energy efficiency, increased use of renewable energy, and cleaner cars.

Jewish law reminds us not to waste, to protect natural areas and to save human life. These reductions will do just that by reducing U.S. dependence on oil, protecting pristine places from oil drilling, improving air quality and other far-reaching benefits. Global warming is the most important environmental challenge of our time and I strongly urge you to support this important bill.

Better fuel economy standards for American automobiles Date: Dear [Decision Maker] ,

I am writing to urge you to support a strong increase in Corporate Average Fuel-Economy (CAFE) standards. Making our cars and trucks go farther on a gallon of gas is an important step in critical efforts to reduce global warming pollution and our addiction to oil. Increasing CAFE standards is a proven policy to boost the miles-per-gallon of new vehicles.

HR 6 contains modest improvements to CAFE standards, increasing CAFE to 35 mpg by 2020. Sen. Levin, however, proposes to weaken even these mild standards to an average of 30 mpg by 2025. This is unacceptable. Please oppose efforts like the Levin amendment to weaken the CAFE standards contained in HR 6, and work to encourage the adoption of stronger emissions standards of at least 40 mpg.
